The Maratha Empire was established in the mid-seventeenth century by the ambitious general and first Chhatrapati Shivaji Bhonsle. It consisted of a decentralised network of allied kingdoms that extended from the western Deccan to various regions of the Indian subcontinent. This dissertation contends that despite the negative label of "confederacy" attached to the Company, the Maratha state was able to establish a modern diplomatic system of discussion, decision-making, and cooperation through the rise of bureaucratic networks and their effective communication methods. The scribal-bureaucratic networks that gained power in the eighteenth-century Maratha Empire achieved a significant milestone by developing a versatile language and communication system that surpassed linguistic, cultural, religious, and political barriers. This dissertation examines the individuals and households of the Chandraseniya Kayastha Prabhu sub-caste to illustrate that both non-Brahman and Brahman officials, who were proficient in verbal and written communication, advanced from lower positions in the Maratha bureaucracy to influential roles in political decision-making.

Guha, S. (2019) The initial version of Indian history was created by British historians. The English populace exhibited a lack of interest in the Marathas. The Mughal dynasty and the pre-existing states of Rajasthan garnered significantly more favourable attention. The historical account that the British saved India from turmoil also necessitated portraying the Marathas as rapacious instigators of chaos. This portrayal has led to the reduction of the commercial vitality and adaptability of the Maratha administration. The Maratha taxes were not detrimental. It functioned within a fluid political economy. Although occasionally impacted, like previous Indian governments, by climatic disasters or political crises, its economy has the ability to recover swiftly during more favourable periods. The Maratha Empire exemplified a distinctive association between a populace and a dominion. Common farmers from Maharashtra actively participated in the troops of the Maratha Empire, took pride in its political accomplishments, and strongly associated with the Maratha homeland. The kingdom also exhibited a consistent adherence to the symmetrical patterns of kinship and marriage that were traditionally practiced in Maharashtra. Although sons born to secondary brides had the potential to attain prestigious positions within the family lineage, marriages of higher social standing mostly involved women of elevated status. Affinal

relatives were acknowledged and had a significant influence on governance. In contrast to the Mughal Empire, the Marathas employed their own language in all the regions under their control, thereby enhancing and expanding it continuously. This foreshadowed the emergence of linguistic nationalisms across India during the British colonial era.

O'Hanlon, R. (2020) In the 18th century in South Asia, individuals known as 'political' vakils were primarily recognised as diplomats who played an active role in negotiating between different states during that time. The *ilchī* and *hejib* of earlier eras, who were linked to the service of courts & states, differed from them. Maratha political vakils, similar to their counterparts, primarily functioned as movable representatives of specific monarchs. Their endeavours beyond the confines of the diplomatic sphere. Given the significance of revenue rights in inter-state negotiations, vakils frequently supervised the organisation of local-level tax collection. They frequently represented multiple employers and played crucial roles in transferring money to cover their own expenses, contribute to the court's gift economy, pay local mercenaries, and make initial payments for revenue farms on behalf of their employers. Political vakils, who often came from families with a long history of working as vakils across different regions, relied on the support of their extended families. These vakils were able to move around freely while maintaining strong ties to local economies and societies. They exhibited certain traits similar to the 'portfolio capitalism' of the eighteenth century. However, what set them apart was their ability to access extensive networks of political information across the subcontinent, as well as their proficiency in the art of negotiation and persuasion. This knowledge allowed them to effectively utilise local social networks and political institutions to their advantage. The flexible and entrepreneurial service position was fragmented and dispersed throughout the lower echelons of colonial bureaucracy due to the colonial reforms implemented in the late eighteenth century. The traditional role of the political vakil was replaced by the semi-professional 'local pleader' in courts of law, as well as by 'munshi' aides and translators serving the Residents of the princely states within the uncovenanted civil service.
